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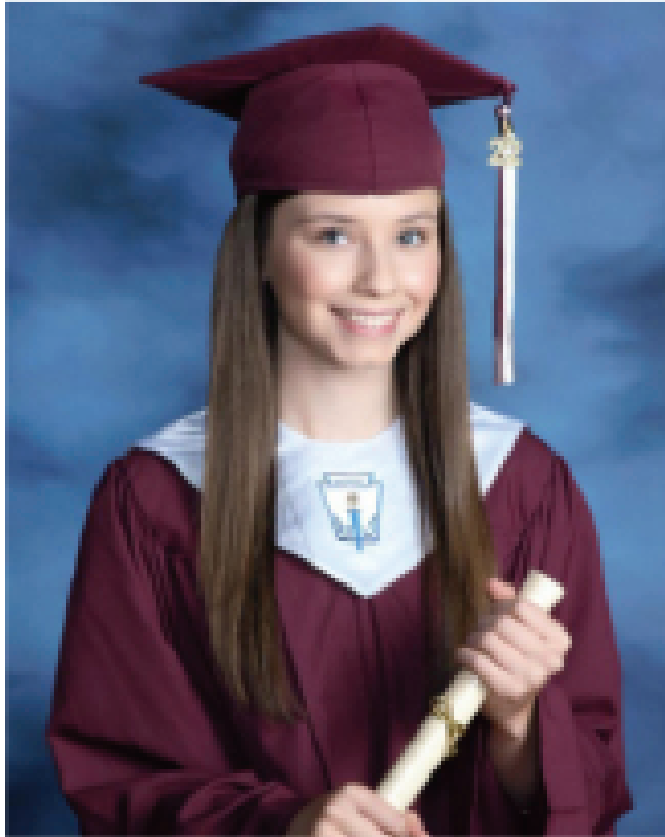
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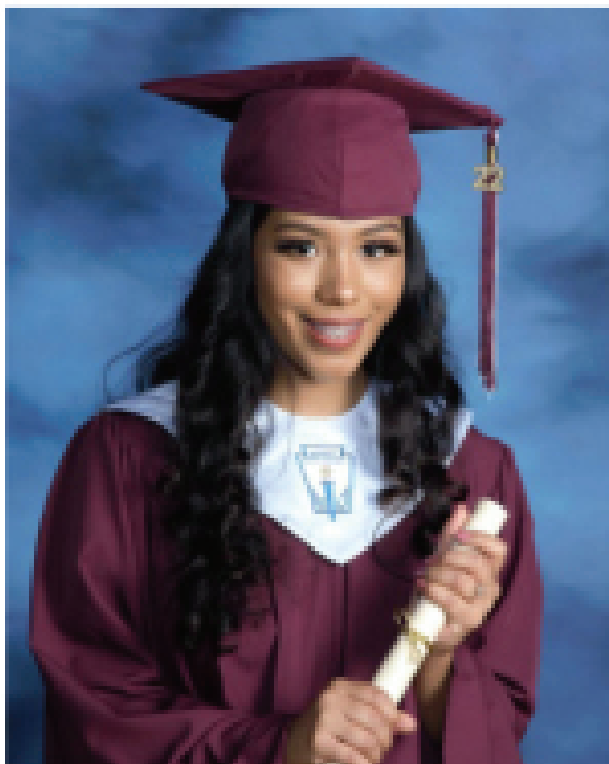

We Honor Our Retirees



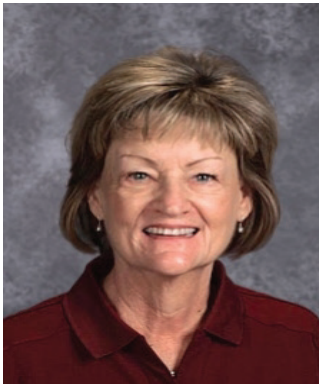
Cindy Darden

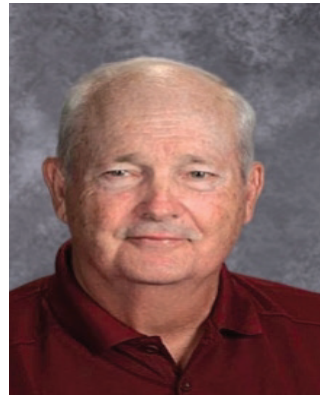
Dianna Ford

Larry's plans for retirement--he plans to enjoy life. Other than that you might find him playing golf, working around the house visiting his three sisters, and doing more things with my wife.



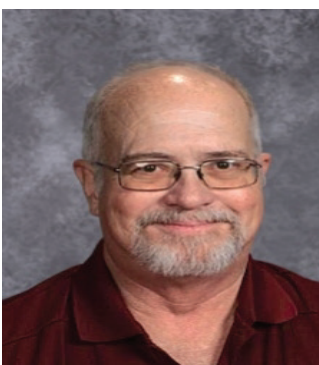
Jan Russell

AMY BALLENTINE



Amy Ballentine, Hillsboro ISD Secondary Teacher of the year, did not originally want to be a teacher.

But after the birth of her son and reestablishing her faith in God she followed his guidance and became a teacher. She just completed her fourth year at Hillsboro High School (HHS). "Each group that comes through my doors teaches me something new," Ballentine shared. "I love to let the students teach me as I learn alongside them. For me, I just come to work and give it everything I've got. It's just me doing my job that I am honored to be able to do. I've never considered being awarded Teacher of the Year but to really see everyone, even my students, recognizing me was an insanely rewarding experience."

When asked what is one thing that your students would be surprised to learn about you, Ballentine responded that in Middle School, she played in a club soccer league. She was the number one ranked goaltender in the state of Texas for two years, having zero goals scored in the amount of time played.

"Choosing teaching as a career has had a humbling and extremely significant effect on the person that I now am and I wouldn't change any of it," said Ballentine.

WAY TO GO!

Shattered Dreams



Hillsboro High School (HHS) offers many activities and events orchestrated by teachers and students that provide first hand life lessons. One such event is Shattered Dreams. A bi-annual event, Shattered Dreams is a program that Hillsboro High School supports in association with Hill County and the City of Hillsboro first responders to demonstrate the dangers associated with drunk driving and distracted driving. This program is led by staff members, Officer Lynelle Sparks, Ms. Amy Ballentine and students who volunteer to participate. Approximately 40 active participants took part in the event that impacted the entire HHS student body and staff very powerfully. Students were taken out of class every 15 minutes to represent a death from drinking while driving. A simulated crash site was set up in front of the high school. Students heard an actual 911 call over the intercom and quickly processed to the front lawn to witness in real time the actual first responders at the scene of the accident. Part of the mock-up of the event included HHS students participating as victims injured or killed by a drunk driver. The following day students and staff attended a moving "memorial" service held for the victims. Despite the community sponsored event only lasting only two days, it took months of preparation. The entire program is designed in hopes of persuading students to avoid drinking and driving. Additionally, students participating learn through realistic experiences of visiting the local police station, court house, morgue, and hospital in order to learn first hand what happens when someone is killed or arrested as part of a drunk-driving incident. The Shattered Dreams program intends to have a lasting effect on Hillsboro High School and the community and will hopefully cause students to make smarter decisions about drinking and distracted driving and potentially save a life.

Vicki Ellison, was awarded the 2022 Lifetime Achievement Award at the Legacy Reception from the Hillsboro Education Foundation. She was a true blessing to Hillsboro Independent School District (HISD) and all that had the privilege to work with her. Vicki once said, "I have always loved teaching, it was never a job to me. It was fun, challenging, hard work, love, fun, repeat..."

Mrs. Ellison grew up in Grand Prairie, Tx. She graduated from Grand Prairie High School and went on to East Texas State University where she met and later married her great love, Hugh Ellison. She began her 45 year teaching career in Gainesville, Tx at Gainesville State School. Vicki's early years of teaching were spent in Grand Prairie, Spring, Richardson and Tyler.

Throughout her career she mentored many first year teachers and student teachers, some of whom went on to teach in our district.



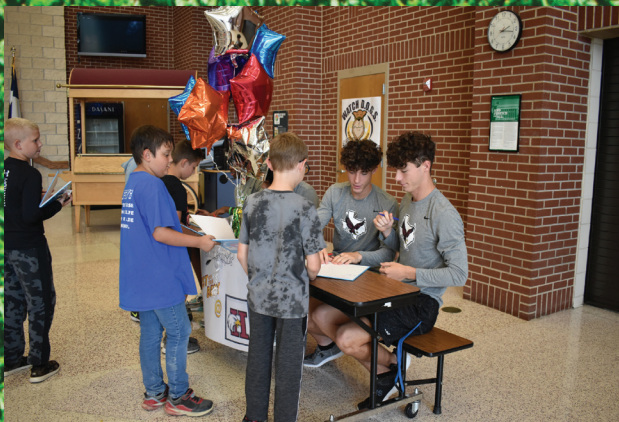
CAT PATTERSON
